A few words from Valentina Zaharia-Smith President of Children in Distress Romania

The past few months have seen exciting developments with our work in Romania.

We celebrated the opening of Casa Maria, our wonderful new hospice for the children in our care in Bucharest. We were delighted to have our Patron, HRH Princess Maria of Romania, officially open the new home. We continued the celebration with a reception with the British Ambassador to Romania. You can read more about this in the following pages along with photographs of Princess Maria with our children. We have also acquired a property for Pineview Retreat Lodge, our planned integrative centre for children with special needs that'll be located in the mountains of Zarnesti. Elsewhere, we setup non-profits in Germany and the United States. It has been a very busy year!

So much has been accomplished since Children in Distress was established over three decades ago. Through those years we have provided loving care to approximately 20,000 children and young adults in our various programs.

The last few years have been challenging, with COVID's impact on our children and staff and financial burdens. We needed to make some changes to met new Romanian government standards for childcare, which led to the purchase and renovation of Casa Maria, allowing us to provide enhanced family-style care.

We could never have achieved all we have without your support nor weathered the recent difficulties. We are so grateful for all your help and for staying with us on this journey.

On the occasion of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Children in Distress team celebrated the opening of Casa Maria, a new home that meets the highest standards of care.

From the first moment we thought of opening Casa Maria, we wanted a warm and bright house where our children could feel the love and peace of a family. And we did it.

The dedication was indeed a celebration. Her Royal Highness Princess Maria of Romania took part in the ribbon cutting along with many supporters, volunteers, and staff. Her patronage has been fundamental, because after many trials and tribulations, our children can finally feel at home.

The celebration continued at the residence of the British Ambassador, His Excellency Andrew Noble. The evening commenced with speeches from Mrs. Helen Noble, on behalf of His Excellency, Valentina Paula Smith, head of Children in Distress Foundation, Simon Errington Co-Chair of CiD UK, Rev. Frauke Ackerman Chair of HikHer (the German charity set up for CiD's support) and Her Royal Highness Princess Maria of Romania.

The theme of the event was **Unity**. Together we can achieve many great things and Casa Maria is proof of that. While we sadly cannot help every child who needs us, we are committed to making sure that each child in our care has the best life possible that they can.

Our hope for the future is to transition from traditional orphanages to group homes where better care can be provided for all children in need.

Casa Maria offers us the opportunity to deliver our therapy and recovery sessions in a more pleasant and motivating environment.

From the first days spent in their new home, the children were looking forward to getting back into their normal activities.

With great curiosity, they were interested in the new home where they will continue their therapy, lessons, playgroups and physical therapy sessions.

Both for the CiD's specialists and for our children, this moment represented an opportunity to set new objectives regarding the development framework and the way to implement the activity in the new place.

Naturally, we started the sessions in Casa Maria by getting familiarised with the new environment, as well as the new structure of the sessions. The children quickly recognised the place had been specially designed for each individual activity.

The living room was the ideal location for our regular good morning circle activity and games. As in every home, it is the place in the house where the whole family gathers to spend time together.

Outside, we concentrated on fun with movement, balls and running, so that the children could feel at ease and can enjoy every moment spent in nature.

Five of our children started the school year in their new home at Casa Maria. The process of adjusting went very well and the home schooling activities were resumed with their teacher.

Cristina, Andrei, Bubu, Stefan and Cristiana were delighted to see their teacher and proudly showed her their new house.

After this tour, the little ones were very eager to show the lady what new things they had learned during the vacation. Then, with great seriousness and interest, they resumed the school program working with numbers and letters, but they also enjoyed new educational games. Their teacher appreciated their effort and love for learning and congratulated them for the progress made so far. We too are very proud of them!

Summer was a good opportunity for

our children to get together with our volunteers.

Every week volunteers from the Faculty of Medicine in Bucharest came to our house and got involved in different activities. Running around the yard and playing with the ball was one of the favourite games for the children.

The kids enjoy construction games and playing with plasticine together. The volunteers bring a lot of joy to the children and inspire them to develop their creativity.

Our little ones remembered old friends and made new ones. Weather being kind to us, the children managed to spend a lot of time outdoors with them.

For our children, it is a real joy to have a yard full of friends who will give them all the attention they need and the joy of spending time together. And when it's time to rest, peace and calm is provided by stories and songs.

Every volunteer or friend of the children is part of the big CiD family, the place where children's love is unconditional.

Casa Maria is set and equipped as a family house where the children can feel the warmth of a home, the affection of a family.

We were surprised how easily and quickly the children integrated into the community.

From the first days, the children from the neighbourhood were curious to meet our little ones and play with them. Our children were happy and enjoyed how warmly and friendly they were received.

Children and staff enjoy the advantages of a small community. Getting to know the new neighbourhood continued in the park near the house, where a nice playground is available.

During summer our Andrei turned eight, Mihaela three and Cristina 11.

Everybody is looking forward to seeing how the children will celebrate their birthdays in their new home, how parties will be at Casa Maria.


In this new family environment there are naturally high expectations that the cakes, gifts, playing, dancing and fun will be more pleasant than at the old St. Margaret's centre.

During all this time, our little ones managed to learn new things such as: geometric shapes, their colors and shades, objects specific to the care of puppies – like collar, leash, bowl, brush – and to develop their vocabulary with new words, such as sit, lie down, and leash.

All this information supported the development of life skills, offering children a new perspective of social inclusion.

By learning elements of training in a controlled environment, our little ones managed to develop the ability to walk with the puppies near their home by the end of the project.

We were all happy to see the progress of each child as it translated into natural interactions with other children in the neighbourhood.

Stefan was the one who made the greatest efforts to focus himself on the responsibility of walking the puppy. Andrei showed a lot of empathy, care and responsibility, being careful that he and his puppy were safe on the street.

With the help of the puppy Betti, Cristina bravely managed to overcome her fear of other puppies in the neighbouring houses, who barked at every step.

Bubu managed to form many more sentences through the commands he gave to the puppies. The great joy was when he was able to express his own experiences without repeating the adult's words.

Although quite timid in the interaction with the puppies, Cristiana managed to feel the control and balance she needed through the walks with them. With each walk made with the puppies, the children enjoyed greater contact with other members of the community that they now belong to.

Although we are saddened by the end of this wonderful project, we keep in our hearts the joy of the children's successes and hope that next year we will resume this wonderful project!

Dr Michael Janson Scholarship Programme

Children in Distress, in partnership with the Arges County School Inspectorate, has operated over the last three school years a scholarship programme named after Dr. Michael Janson, whose generous legacy provides the funds for the scholarships.

The programme was a success and has had a great impact on the lives of the students who received the scholarships, and on others who were encouraged by it to improve their school performance to qualify for the scholarship.

Therefore, we decided to continue to award 10 scholarships in the school year 2022 – 2023, as part of our school abandonment prevention programs.

The scholarships target mainly rural and poor areas. In addition to school performance, one of the criteria according to which the scholarship applications are assessed is the economic status of the applicant's family.

This school year the scholarships will be granted around Christmas, to high school students in the 9th grade, in one single payment.

The scholarship project is a successful educational and school abandonment prevention program which we intend to transform into an ongoing service in the lives of the Arges county students.

We hope that this initiative will be supported by our local and foreign sponsors who will recognize what a difference it makes for the students who because of their poverty would not have been able to advance and reach their full potential.

Pineview

A new retreat for children with special needs



For the past 30 years Children in Distress has gained broad and deep experience in caring for children with special needs. For hundreds of children and their families, CiD has provided thousands of hours of physiotherapy, speech therapy, art therapy, socialisation programmes, and psychological counselling.

In this work, we realise that most children with special needs have little or no access to recreational and socialisation activities, such as playgrounds, camps, and field trips. The fact is that in developing recreational activities, children with special needs are mostly ignored. This situation risks marginalisation and social isolation for children and parents or caregivers, if they have them. To go somewhere to have fun, to have a "change of scenery", to relax, is not an option.

Children in Distress aims to do something to redress this situation. Our vision is to build Pineview Retreat Lodge. The Lodge would be a complex which offers children with special needs time from their normal lives, a chance for their social integration, recreation, and therapy services.

Parents and caregivers also would have a time to rest and relax, and learn new

techniques for child-rearing in difficult circumstances.

Children in Distress has acquired a beautiful piece of land for the Lodge in the Carpathian Mountains (the Romanian Alps), near the town of Zarnesti.

t therapy, socialisation programmes, ad psychological counselling. An architect has donated her services to draw up the design plans. There is plenty of room in the Lodge for accommodation, physical therapy, communal meals, and a chapel space for prayer.

The property outdoors has a generous yard, with room for a playground, gazebo, and vegetable and flower gardens.


Children in Distress is in the process of obtaining the required approvals for the Lodge, including a construction permit.

We are raising money to cover the design works and, subject to available funds, we hope to start construction by the end of the next year.

Ukraine Relief

Children in Distress continues to support evacuees from Ukraine who are in Romania.

Our current support focuses on food donations to the evacuee centre at Romexpo, the Bucharest Convention Centre. We are in close contact with Cosmina Simean, the General Director for Social Assistance of Bucharest. At Romexpo, evacuees have access to all sorts of items, from food to clothing, free of charge. There is also overnight accommodation and access to services for processing refugee papers. Most of the evacuees are mothers and children. Ms Simean contacts CiD when supplies

run low and asks us to help to fill up their stores. The most recent request, filled in mid-October, was for large quantities of flour, sugar and oil. We purchased these items in bulk at a discount market and then delivered them to Romexpo. Several of our high school volunteers helped unload and stack the supplies in the market area of the convention centre.

CiD will continue this work at Romexpo for as long as there is the need. Thank you to those who generously donated to our Ukrainian Appeal. Your generosity directly provides food for struggling mothers and their children. The St. Christopher's Centre is well known in the Curtea de Arges community. During the summer vulnerable children from there and nearby are involved in activities and programs helping them to overcome their different problems and support them, especially to remain in school.

One of the causes of leaving school is the lack of financial support. We do our best to involve the local community in our school programs, asking for a donation of clothes and school supplies.

Our efforts were rewarded and many good-hearted people answered our call.

When the children arrived at St. Christopher's at the beginning of the new school year, they had a great surprise, finding clothes to keep them warm the whole winter, school supplies and other items necessary at school.

For the children it was a joy, but for their families it was a relief that they could, at least partially, overcome the worries and big expenses they have to cover every new school year.

We were told by the donors that their greatest satisfaction was to see the joy in the children's eyes, their excitement when they put on the new clothes, when they examined all the school supplies and the other items received.

Many thanks to all our supporters who made this wonderful surprise possible.

The good response of the community to our calls for help encourages us to continue to assist these vulnerable children, to develop for them new successful programs.


